The archive in ACCS is a testament to her superb work as an administrator and manager. She was ably supported in this by Debbie and so, thankfully, the succession goes on.

Susan pored over the accounts and never were they given more detailed attention than when Malachy was Treasurer.

Searching for that last cent which appeared in the wrong column had to be located and fixed before the lights went out in Centrepoint. We have always been conscious that we needed to make the best use of limited resources and Susan responded to this as per the old adage, "we try harder."

There are probably not many people who have witnessed so much change in an organisation over such a long period as Susan. Susan did not see change as easy. She was very aware of what serious and difficult adjustments such change meant for her working life and relationships. For Susan the Annual Convention started when the present one finished. Other large organisations employed external companies to organise such events. Susan's intimate knowledge of ACCS needs and her relationships with Board members throughout the country made her the ideal 'company' for ACCS to organise its Convention. I still shudder when I think of the first meeting after Christmas setting the deadlines for reports to be submitted for Convention handbook. Curses on you Seán McCann for setting the bar so high!

Convention was also the opportunity for Susan to meet with all her friends on Boards throughout the country and touch base with them. This contact would energise her for the year ahead. She treated everybody equally, gave them the respect they deserved and had warm relationships with all from cleaning staff to Presidents, and even General Secretaries. There was a certain tipping point at Convention when Susan's organisation and attention to detail meant that things would now flow. This almost always coincided with the President's reception and from that point on it was a signal for Susan to sit back and enjoy, never was a G & T more welcome. It was wonderful and comforting to witness. Convention was the pinnacle of Susan's ACCS year, and to paraphrase Goldsmith, "and still they gazed and still their wonder grew that one small head could carry all she knew."
